Write about yourself, emphasizing your qualification of the photographer in the first paragraph of the document. Highlight past photography experiences working in schools, with children's athletics or other activities aimed at children. Explain the benefits of choosing a service in a short second paragraph. Boast about fast processing times, quality printing services, local economic support and compare your tariffs with your competitors. Strengthen your professional qualification in the third point. Explain your college-level photography training, workshops attended or photography awards related to schools or children. Introducing your bet in the fourth paragraph.
